

- Welcome to Your Placement Practice -


Placement Exercises: In the first lesson we will practice placement in order to let our minds and hands get familiar with where the features go.




- The face is divided into thirds.
- The first third is the hairline to the eyebrow line.
- Then from the eyebrow line to the nose.
- The last third is the nose to the chin.

- The head is divided into halves.
- The first half is from the top of the head to the eye line.
- The second half is from the eye line to the chin.







Your warm-ups don't have to be perfect. We are just trying to lay down a good foundation for great faces!



- Draw an oval and two lines to form the neck.
- Use loose lines for now and when you have everything placed where you want it you can make the lines more permanent.
- Draw a horizontal line across the middle of the oval
- Draw a vertical line down the middle of the oval.
- The horizontal line is the eye line.
- The head is typically 5 eyes across. Start with an eye shape in the center and then work your way out. It make take more than one try (for me it did!).
- Don't worry about the details of the eye at this point we just need a place holder.
- Once you erase the eye in the middle and two on the sides your eyes will be in the right spot.
- Draw a line above the eyes. This is the eyebrow line.
- Halfway between the eyebrow line and the chin is the nose.
- The width of the nose will be the distance between the two eyes. Keep in mind different faces will vary!
- The bottom lip should fall halfway between the nose and the chin. Sometimes the mouth is the width between each pupil.
- The ears start at the eyebrow line and end at the nose. We will cover ears later on in the book!
- After everything is in place shape the jawline.
- The jaw line tapers out from the chin. Some people have a pronounced jawline and others don't. In the example, I've drawn a soft jawline. See the skull in the reference photos here to get a visual.
- Make a very small indent where the eyes and the eyebrows meet. This is to shape the cheek bones. You should still have room on both sides of the eyes.
